Medical center lands at JFK

Airport opens onsite health clinic for its 50,000 workers and the occasional passenger with chest pains. Look! An isolation room for ebola outbreaks!

After a year and a half in limbo, John F. Kennedy International Airport's medical center reopened last month in a newer, bigger facility.

Called JFK Advanced Medical, the 5,000-square-foot office, located in Building 75 of the airport's cargo area, is open to the public but serves mainly as a health clinic for the airport. Between airline employees, ground crews, ticket agents, security personnel, tenants and vendors, about 50,000 people work at JFK.

"It's really its own city," David Rosenthal, the clinic's manager, said of the airport. His practice is the nearest emergency room serving the 45 million passengers who fly through the hub every year.

JFK Advanced Medical had a clinic at the airport for more than a decade, first privately managed, and then run by Mary Immaculate Hospital and St. John's Hospital. When the hospitals filed for bankruptcy about two years ago, the clinic was forced to close.

Mr. Rosenthal and his colleagues have spent the last year and a half building a new facility, this time affiliated with Jamaica Hospital Medical Center. "It's a more robust medical center than we've had before," said a spokesperson for the Port Authority of New York & New Jersey, which owns and operates JFK.

With three doctors on staff—covering internal medicine, neurology and orthopedics—as well as several physical therapists and lab technicians, the clinic is open 24 hours a day, seven days a week. In addition to basic urgent care, the staff specializes in travel medicine such as immunizations, screenings, and drug and alcohol testing. They handle the annual physical exams for pilots as required by the Federal Aviation Administration and work with immigration services when there are medical issues.

The facility also has an isolation room, which could come in handy during the next outbreak of SARS or avian flu.

About 80% of the clinic's patients work at the airport, said Mr. Rosenthal. The most common complaints are shoulder injuries, lower back or neck pain, and of course people getting hit in the head with baggage—it is an airport, after all.

"We're not cracking open chests, but we do stitches for lacerations and have a crash cart," Mr. Rosenthal said. "We treat a lot of people coming in with chest pains." The team was recently called to a terminal for a passenger having an anxiety attack.

Anything requiring surgery, however, would get shuttled to nearby Jamaica Hospital. The clinic also works with Brookdale University Hospital and Flushing Hospital Medical Center.

The clinic is developing an Employee Assist Program which, in addition to providing support for employees dealing with addiction, offers anger-management counseling. That no doubt comes in handy when dealing with JFK travelers.




